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
It was awesome to see so many of you at the OVDBA Christmas gathering! We all enjoyed games, tasty food, making crafts, winning prizes, and most of all: each other!

## **Farming and Football:** What do they have in common?



The days of making jerseys from the wool of sheep is long past, but there is a very important item that is used in modern football that comes from a farm animal. Can you guess what it is? It's a football! Surprisingly enough, though footballs are thought to be made of pigskin, they are actually made of cowhide.

Wilson Football, the official manufacturer of NFL balls, handmakes approximately 4,000 footballs each day or 700,000 footballs annually in Ada, Ohio. That's a lot of cow hides! Though not confirmed, it has been said that a Super Bowl game requires 216 footballs.



One cowhide produces up to 20 footballs.

So why is it called pigskin?



Footballs were originally made from the bladders of pigs. When the pigs were butchered for meat, the bladder was inflated into a small ball. I won't ask how they inflated their ball.
